Bankhead Fire Tower receives site visit for restoration efforts

On March 12, AHC staff attended a site visit to Talladega National Forest to see the historic Bankhead Fire Tower. The United States Forest Service invited AHC to attend along with the Friends of the Talladega National Forest, who have offered to rehabilitate the tower in efforts to preserve the remaining structure.

The proposed work will be to replace the treads on the stairway and also replace the fence around the compound as a way to continue preserving the tower. AHC staff encouraged the Friends group to apply for grant funding for financial assistance.

The fire tower is said to have been built in 1937 by junior African-American Enrollee Company 3477, which was housed near Heflin.

Fort Morgan opens second gift shop location

Last month the staff at Fort Morgan held a soft opening for the second gift shop location just in time for spring break tourists.

The new gift shop is housed in a building that was historically the Hospital Steward's quarters, constructed in 1899 by the United States Army. The post hospital was adjacent to it, but was destroyed by fire in 1919. The hospital was not rebuilt due to the decrease of soldiers stationed at Fort Morgan following World War I.

The building was renovated following Hurricane Sally in 2020 and is now an additional gift shop to help with increased visitation.

Site Director Heather Tassin said "We are thrilled to have the second gift shop opened and it has already become popular with tourists riding on the ferry to and from Dauphin Island."

The gift shop features a variety of items Fort Morgan themed including shirts, hats, drinkware, toys, and more. Hours and location of the new gift shop can be found here.

Fort Mims plants new trees for spring season

On March 6, the Fort Mims Restoration Association (FMRA), Baldwin County park employees, and Grasshopper's Landscaping, planted 13 trees on the property at Fort Mims. The trees, selected by President of FMRA Claudia Campbell, included live oak, bay, and red maple, which are indigenous to the area. These trees will enhance the natural beauty of the park and provide much needed shade for park visitors and reenactors during the annual living history and battle commemoration in August.

The Society of the War of 1812 in Alabama, who held their annual 2023 State Meeting at the Fort Mims event in August, made a generous donation for trees to be planted to replace those lost at the site during Hurricane Sally.

State Archaeologist Stacye Hathorn monitored excavation during planting to ensure that no archaeological deposits were disturbed.

Fort Mims is one of the historic properties owned by the Alabama Historical Commission and operated by the FMRA.

AHC, along with the Cahawba Foundation, the Cahawba Advisory Council, and other colleagues and friends celebrated Linda on March 27 with a picnic lunch at Old Cahawba. Linda began her career with the AHC in 1985 and served as site director of Old Cahawba Archaeological Park for 39 years. She was instrumental in the development of the park, and made significant contributions to the site, including the coordination of land acquisition to complete the park; developing programming, managing the return of the historic St. Luke's Church to the site, coordinating archaeological excavations, and overseeing the construction of a ghost structure at the site of the original statehouse. Linda will return to state service as a retired state employee, and work on special projects at Cahawba.
